Today we commemorate Candlemas or 'The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord'. It was a Jewish custom which involved the parents of Jesus taking him to the temple in Jerusalem to be dedicated to God the Father as the firstborn son, 40 days after being born (as was the Mosaic law). Candlemas is celebrated on 2 February as this is also 40 days after Christmas Day. Originally, it is thought the feast was celebrated on 14 February, the 40th day after Epiphany (6 January), because the date of Christmas was not fixed on 25 December. By the last quarter of the fourth century, however, the Church at Rome had begun to celebrate the Nativity on 25 December, so the Feast of the Presentation was moved to 2 February, 40 days later.

Beauty and the Beast Review - Written by Year 13 St Gregory's Student, Sammy C



St Gregory's rendition of the timeless classic Beauty and the Beast moved through comedic, heartwarming and even harrowing moments seamlessly, keeping the audience entertained and moved for 90 minutes straight. The audience were so lucky to enjoy a showcase of talent from students across ages 11-18, and it was clear that the younger students were inspired by the older cast members' commitment to their roles through the way that they reflect their energy

and excitement onstage. St Gregory's is an outstanding example of why youth theatre is so important in any community. Their performance shows how a creative outlet can be a pivotal experience for a young person, and why giving opportunities to every student is so vital.

There were many beautiful moments in this performance but the highlight for me was not any particular moment but the dedication to characterisation that each actor exhibited. Belle exemplified everything the original Disney princess stands for: she was smart, feisty, and kind, whilst bringing her own humorous twist to the classic character. Her singing voice was incredible with that beautiful Disney princess quality that you would hope to hear, and the ability to act through her voice in such a touching way.





The Beast managed to bring a gruff, animalistic quality to his character, which you could imagine is exceedingly difficult to achieve, and the transformation of his character through the development of his relationship with Belle was performed brilliantly. As we all know,

onstage chemistry is the most awkward part of a school production, yet you could see that the pair approached this obstacle with professionalism and care, shown by the authenticity of emotion in their onstage relationship.

A pivotal aspect of Disney shows is always the joy and light-hearted fun that coincide with the more

emotional moments, and the comedic pairing of Cogsworth and Lumiere brought that element to the show in a way you would not expect from a youth production.



Cogsworth's character was hilarious, and you could see the added extra moments that are so necessary to bring a show from just a reenactment of the script to a performance that keeps their audience engaged. Cogsworth's character was perfectly paired with Lumiere's, who somehow kept an amusing French accent for the entire show! Their witty back and forth was brought to life by their brilliant comedic timing, making their performance one to remember.





Overall, this production was magical, and the magic came not only from the sparkling performance of the cast, but from the spirit of the family of St Gregory's Performing Arts.

Benefit Related Free School Meals All School Years

Is your household earned income/take home pay below £616.67 per month?

Is your child missing out on Benefit Related Free School Meals?

- If your household earned income/take home pay is below £616.67 per month, (which is equivalent to £7,400 per year) and your child attends a Bath & North East Somerset academy or maintained school then you could be entitled to Benefit Related Free School Meals?
- Your household income is the figure that Universal Credit use to work out how much Universal Credit to pay you, **not** your actual Universal Credit payment.
- If your child is in Reception, Year 1 or Year two and receives Universal Infant Free School Meals, you can still apply for the Benefit Related Free School Meals.

Please do not reapply if your child is already in receipt of Benefit Related Free School Meals.

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods) Income Support
- Income-Based Jobseekers Allowance

- Child Tax Credit (WITHOUT Working Tax Credit) and have and annual household income (as assessed by HMRC) below £16,190
- Working Tax Credit Run-on which is only paid for four weeks after you STOP qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- The Guaranteed Element of State Pension Credit
- Support under PartV1 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

Reporting Absences

Absences

Feature on the Class Charts (parent) App

Please use the Class Charts app to notify the school if your child is going to be absent. The absence telephone line is still available, however we would prefer you to use this app if possible. This should not only be easier for you, but will allow the school to be more efficient when recording student absences. Once we have acknowledged the absence, you will receive a confirmation email to the account that is registered in the app.

You can also report planned absences such as medical appointments.

If your school has decided to allow parents to report absences, you will see the Absences tab when viewing pupils from that school.

Selecting this tab will display a list of absences that you have reported, once you have reported them. This includes when the absence took place, the reason for the absence and who acknowledged your absence report.

To report an absence, click on the Report new absence button.

Next, enter the details of the reported absence into the form provided.

You can also include up to 5 files in your absence report as supporting evidence. To do this, click on the Attach supporting evidence button and select the files of your choice.

Click on the Submit button to send your pupil's absence report to their school. The absence can be edited and deleted until it has been acknowledged by a teacher.

Non-Uniform Day - Thursday 8 February






Hope this week finds you all well.

You do not need any past experience of volunteering or working in groups to apply.

What do the Autistic Voices Panel do?

- · The SASS Autistic Voices Panel meet at least three times each academic year (Sept-July)
- The group add their voice and life experience of education to SASS and help us develop our training and support for schools, young people and their families in B&NES
- Keep SASS focussed on the current issues facing autistic children and young adults in B&NES
- When other opportunities are available, they might be asked to attend and speak at local Conferences and events, share their
 experiences with professionals in film, and contribute to national consultations and research projects.

How does the panel work?

- We will meet a minimum of 3 times a year (maximum of 6) and meetings are held in the afternoons
- We will give you the option of meeting online or in person
- If you cannot attend a meeting, please let us know.
- Before the meeting, you will be sent the agenda and any worksheets.

Who will I be supported by?

The group is run by SASS. Sarah will contact you and will be at meetings. There may be some more members of the SASS team
who join us: we will let you know who is coming.

· If you have specific support needs, please let us know. The Autistic Voices Panel is an open, inclusive and accessible place.

Face-to-face Routes into STEM 2023/24

Routes into STEM is an experience that provides an amazing opportunity to help students understand the different routes to further STEM education and career pathways.

Who is it for?

Students in Year 9 and 10 who are interested in finding out more about STEM careers. Students should also be within one-hour of travel distance of locations.

What is involved?

- · A three-day local experience that includes a day in a university and two days at STEM companies local to them
