Year 8 Kintbury Residential, 1 - 3 March 2024

Last weekend Miss Phillips, Mrs West and I had the pleasure of accompanying a group of our Year 8 students to the Lasallian Retreat Centre, St Cassian's in Kintbury. Having the 'pleasure to accompany' is central to everything that took place over the weekend, as we watched the young people grow in their own way as the time went on. One of our young people was honest in their assessment commenting that "On the coach here I didn't really know what to expect, maybe even a bit boring, but its been so much fun. I've loved all of the activities and time we've spent together having a laugh in our groups.".

So much of the Kintbury way is counter cultural for our students – little to no phone reception, no TVs, consoles or Wi-Fi, a timetable that tells them to live in the now and wait to find out what we are doing next. For many of them, having to spend 40 minutes sat together talking over a meal with no phones allowed was a new challenge, yet one that was embraced by everyone and the fruits of this and so many other opportunities for connection really shone through over the two days.

The young people spent the majority of Saturday focusing on awareness – of themselves, of others, of the world around us and of God's presence. They explored this through workshops led by the staff of St Cassian's, times of conversation and reflection in small groups, meditation and prayer as well as team games and activities outdoors. Baskervilles Competition Weekend

Over the weekend Baskervilles School of Gymnastics held its annual Club Competition. The event, spread across three days, was the biggest the club has ever seen with nearly 900 gymnasts taking part in the event.

Held at Baskervilles' hub centre on Englishcombe Lane, Bath, gymnasts from across the club's five centres came together to compete. Competitors took turns performing both a floor routine and a vault jump in front of the judges and a large audience of spectators. The event also included a raffle to raise money for local charities including the 'Ben Saunders Foundation' which is obviously very dear to our hearts at St Gregory's.

The gymnasts were divided into different coloured groups according to age and experience and were competing within these groups. Every gymnast received a participation medal which they all proudly wore in the final ceremony and in each group there were Gold, Silver and Bronze winners in both the floor and vault events.



It was a delightful experience for both the gymnasts and the parents alike and, despite being a competition, the overall experience was one of community, support and friendship. The club is run by a caring family organisation whose ethos is to be inclusive and supportive to all, regardless of age or ability. Many of our St Gregory's students competed in the event, as did many of the children of our staff members. All did exceptionally well and were rightly proud of their achievements. Of special note however was the award given to **Jemima Avison** in Year 10 who won a trophy for the 'Outstanding Achievement Award'. As you can see she was delighted to be awarded this trophy as a mark of her determinism and effort across the seven years she has been a member of the club.

Benefit Related Free School Meals All School Years

Is your household earned income/take home pay below £616.67 per month?

Is your child missing out on Benefit Related Free School Meals?

- If your household earned income/take home pay is below £616.67 per month, (which is equivalent to £7,400 per year) and your child attends a Bath & North East Somerset academy or maintained school then you could be entitled to Benefit Related Free School Meals?
- Your household income is the figure that Universal Credit use to work out how much Universal Credit to pay you, not your actual Universal Credit payment.
- If your child is in Reception, Year 1 or Year two and receives Universal Infant Free School Meals, you can still apply for the Benefit Related Free School Meals.

Please do not reapply if your child is already in receipt of Benefit Related Free School Meals.

Qualifying benefits:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods) Income Support
- Income-Based Jobseekers Allowance
- Income Related Employment Support Allowance
- Child Tax Credit (WITHOUT Working Tax Credit) and have and annual household income (as assessed by HMRC) below £16,190
- Working Tax Credit Run-on which is only paid for four weeks after you STOP qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- The Guaranteed Element of State Pension Credit
- Support under PartV1 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

Reporting Absences

Feature on the Class Charts (parent) App

Please use the Class Charts app to notify the school if your child is going to be absent. The absence telephone line is still available, however we would prefer you to use this app if possible. This should not only be easier for you, but will allow the school to be more efficient when recording student absences. Once we have acknowledged the absence, you will receive a confirmation email to the account that is registered in the app.

You can also report planned absences such as medical appointments.

Absences

If your school has decided to allow parents to report absences, you will see the Absences tab when viewing pupils from that school.

Selecting this tab will display a list of absences that you have reported, once you have reported them. This includes when the absence took place, the reason for the absence and who acknowledged your absence report.

To report an absence, click on the Report new absence button.



Next, enter the details of the reported absence into the form provided.

You can also include up to 5 files in your absence report as supporting evidence. To do this, click on the Attach supporting evidence button and select the files of your choice.

Click on the Submit button to send your pupil's absence report to their school. The absence can be edited and deleted until it has been acknowledged by a teacher.

What do the Autistic Voices Panel do?

- · The SASS Autistic Voices Panel meet at least three times each academic year (Sept-July)
- The group add their voice and life experience of education to SASS and help us develop our training and support for schools, young people and their families in B&NES
- Keep SASS focussed on the current issues facing autistic children and young adults in B&NES
- When other opportunities are available, they might be asked to attend and speak at local Conferences and events, share their
 experiences with professionals in film, and contribute to national consultations and research projects.

How does the panel work?

- We will meet a minimum of 3 times a year (maximum of 6) and meetings are held in the afternoons
- We will give you the option of meeting online or in person
- If you cannot attend a meeting, please let us know.
- Before the meeting, you will be sent the agenda and any worksheets.


Who will I be supported by?


