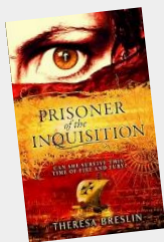




KEY STAGE 4 SUGGESTED READING LIST

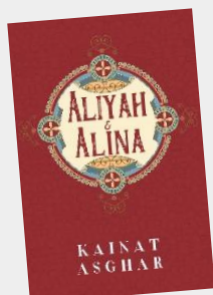


Spain or Shine by Michelle Jellen
